Minutes of the 14th Annual Business Meeting of the Canadian Branch of the Royal Meteorological Society.

1. The Meeting opened at 11:15 a.m. January 28, 1954, in Room 61 of the Economics Building of the University of Toronte, with the President Dr. D. P. McIntyre in the chair and the following members present:

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.27. In his opening remarks the President announced the programme for the evening meeting and briefly reviewed the major activities of the past year.

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3. All The minutes of the 13th Annual Business Meeting had been previously distributed. It was moved by J. L. Knox and seconded by C. M.<sup>n</sup> Penner that the minutes of the 13th Meeting be accepted as n read. Carried.

4. The report of the Executive Committee for 1953 was read by the Secretary. It was moved by the Secretary and seconded by Dr. Godson that the report be adopted. Carried.

5. The report of the "cientific Papers Committee was presented by Dr. Godson, the Convenor. In addition to his report, Dr. Godson noted that the previous Scientific Papers Committee had recommended that members submit for publication more contributions in the form of Letters to the "ditor or Shorter Contributions. He noted that the past year had seen an increase in contributions of this type. It was moved by Dr. Godson and seconded by Mr. Crocker

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5. cont'd that the report of the Scientific Papers Committee be adopted. Carried.

6. The report of the Referees Committee was read by the Secretary. It was moved by the Secretary and seconded by Mr. Mateer that the report be adopted. Carried.

7. The report of the By-Laws Committee was read by the Secretary. It was moved by the Secretary and seconded by Mr. Knox that the report be adopted. Carried.

8. The report of the Membership Committee Had not been received. It was moved by the Secretary and seconded by Mr. Archibald that the incoming Executive be empowered to deal with the report of the Membership Committee when it comes in. Carried.

9. The report of the Treasurer was read by the Treasurer. It was moved by the Treasurer and seconded by Mr. Thomas that the report be adopted. Carried.

10. Mr Wingfield asked whether it was desirable to show bonds held by the Society under Receipts and Expenditures as was done with cash in the bank. It was explained that this was not necessary.

11. Mr Mateer raised a question about the method of computing profit and loss. He suggested that it should be computed as the difference between Receipts and Expenditures and moved that the incoming Treasurer should compute Profit and Loss on this basis. Mr. Noble suggested that it was also desirable to take account of assets and liabilities. Mr. Mateer then amended his motion into the following form •

Moved that the Executive Committee be requested to look into the procedure for showing Profit or Loss in Financial Reports, taking into account the practice of the Parent Society and other Societies in Canada. This motion was seconded by Mr. Mason and carried.

12. Mr. Noble, noting that under Assets was listed the full amount of fees in arrears, asked whether a major part of this was payable to the Parent Society if received, and therefore was not a clear asset. Mr. Mason pointed out that the Canadian Branch assumes the obligation to the Parent Society of fees for members in arrears, and that therefore this amount had already been paid to the Parent Society and any fees in arrears that are received are retained by the Canadian Branch. 13. Mr. Mason, The Treasurer, moved a vote of thanks to the Auditor, Fred Hughes, which was unanimously carried.

14. Mr. Graham, The Secretary, moved that Mr. F. Hughes be appointed Auditor for 1954. This was seconded by Mr. Clodman, and carried.

15. Dr. MoIntyre presented the report of the Nominating Committee. It was moved by Mr. Mateer and seconded by Mr. Lee that this report be adopted. Carried.

16. The President Dr. McIntyre presented the report of the President's Prize Committee. It was moved by Mr. Mason and seconded by Mr. Chilcott that this report be adopted. Carried.

17. The President moved a vote of thanks to the outgoing members of the Executive Committee, Mr. Archibald, Mr. Mason, Mr. Graham; to the Assistant Secretaries, Mr. Saltzman and Mr. Mateer, to the Chairmen of the Standing Committees and the Councillors-at-Large. He also expressed on behalf of the Branch thanks to all those on the Planning Committee of the Toronto Meteorological Conference, its sub-committees, and others who worked on the Conference. Dr. McIntyre moved that the Secretary write to the Chairman of the Planning Committee thanking him, his committee and sub-committees for their work. This was seconded by Dr. Godson and carried.

13. Mr. Graham called attention to the decrease in the number of papers submitted to the Referees Committee, and mentioned a number of possible reasons. He noted that there were normally not enough papers submitted to the Branch to provide material for the regular Branch Meetings and that it was therefore necessary for the "xecutive Committee to select and invite speakers to prepare papers, and recommended that the incoming "xecutive Committee through the "cientific Papers Committee, endeavour to stimulate the submission of papers to the Branch, which would be referred, brought into the best possible form, presented at Canadian Branch meetings and subsequently published by the Canadian Branch or in other publications. He called attention to the fact that Canadian Branch Publications are now achieving wide recognition beyond the membership of the Branch.

19. The Clodman suggested as one reason for the lack of papers submitted to the Refer es Committee, the time element involved in getting papers into print. He suggested that some procedure should

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be considered whereby papers envisaged as suitable for other periodicals as well as presentation at the Canadian Branch be simultaneously presented to the Branch and the periodical.

20. Dr. MoIntyre pointed out that there is a system of checking on the progress of the Referees Committee and the Committee set deadlines for refereeing, and pointed out that the time spent in refereeing by the Canadian Branch is partly compensated by reduction of time spent in refereeing when the papers are submitted to the Juarterly Journal, for example.

21. Inasmuch as this subject was related to another item under new business, it was agreed to defer discussion until later.

22. Mr. Wingfield asked whether the Branch could withheld payment to the Parent Society of the portion due to then Parent Society from fees of members in arrears, until the fees in arrears are collected. Mr. Graham pointed out that members falling into arrears in a given year are carried as full fledged members until the end of the year, and then suspended at the beginning of the next years unless they pay up. Until they are suspended, they receive all the publications and therefore cause an expense to the Parent Society. The Canadian Branch is under obligation therefore to pay the assessment on their behalf to the Parent Society until such members are suspended.

23. Mr. Themas pointed out that some two years age the question of reising the annual fee was discussed with the Parent Society, and that as part of a pac age deal to keep fees down the Canadian Branch assumed obligation for members in arrears.

24. It was recommended that in future letters from the Treasurer or Secretary to members in arrears, it should be pointed out that the Canadian Branch has assumed a liability on their behalf ... and therefore takes a loss if they do not pay up.

Mr. Mason, the Treasurer, moved that the 1954 fees remain the same as for 1953, that is: Initiation fee -32.45,

Associate Membership fee - 6.75,

Fellowship fee - 38.65

This was seconded by Mr. Potter and carried.

26. Under the new business, Mr. Graham pointed out ehe difficulty that he had durin the past year in keeping up with the duties of Secretary especially because of prolonged absences on business during which the work fell behind. He recommended the appointment of an additional Assistant Secretary, in order that the work of the office might be divided and especially in order that when the Secretary is away, the work could go on without interruption.

27. Dr. MoIntyre proposed the idea of the Branch holding a popular lecture once per year. A small admission fee would be collected and it would be planned that the meeting would be selfsupporting. However, in case there should be a deficit, he asked whether it would be in order for the Branch to assume an obligation to pay any deficit arising up to a stated sum, for example \$25.00.

28. Mn. Archibald suggested that the idea might be tried out at no cost by suggesting that the Royal Canadian Enstitute have a Canadian Branch speaker at one of their meetings. Dr. MoIntyre however. felt that the Branch should try to organize the popular meeting them= selves rather than depend on another Society.

29. Mr. Graham suggested that if the Branch Executive could not see their way to organize a popular lecture this year, it might be worthwhile to carry out Mr. Archibald's suggestion. Thereby we would get an idea of public reaction to such a lecture and might get some advertising for future lectures.

30. Mr. McLeod suggested starting in a limited way by having one of the regular Branch meetings as an open night.

31. Mr. Penner suggested that it might not be appropriate to commit Branch funds for any deficit that might be indurred for a popular meeting in orohoginand that it would be more in order to be an conditioned from Fembers' in the Toronto area for a sum of say up to a \$1. seph.in.sase of any deficit. The meeting signified a preferance for this proposal.

72. My... enfor: then moved that the recutive Committee look into the passibility of holding...a. Popular Lecture" and the problem sela financial guarantee. This was seconded by Mr. Turnbull and carried.

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53. Dr. McIntyre suggested that instead of publishing the Canadian Branch Publication whenever there was material for a publication, it be made a regular publication appearing on fixed dates, for example every two months except July ( five months per year). A regular editor would be appointed who would select referees if necessary. It would contain submitted material, announcements, reports of Branch business etc. It was moved by Dr. Godson and seconded by Mr. Thomas that if the Executive Committee be empowered to publish the Canadian Branch publications on a regular basis, determine the best dates, format and title. Carried.

34. Mr. Graham informed the meeting that the Executive Committee had on a temporary basis pending approval by the general meeting, indicated to the Montreal Centre that the Canadian Branch would pay for expenses connected with their meetings on the same basis as expenses for meetings in Toronto. These expenses for Toronto meetings are limited to \$5. or \$6. per meeting, for rental of a room, It was moved by Mr. Graham and seconded by Mr. Crocker that the Executive Committee be empowered to pay for expenses of meetings at other Centres to the same extent as for Toronto meetings. Carried.

35. It was moved by Mr. Penner and seconded by Mr. Crocker that the meeting adjourn. The meeting adjourned at 1 p.m.

# ANNUAL REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE FOR 1955

1. Perhaps the most interesting development during the year 1955 was the establishment of a new Centre at Winnipeg. This in itself, coming after the establishment of a successful Montreal Centre, could well set the trend for a new development and expansion of activities across Canada.

2. Membership, up over last year, stood at 351 at the end of the year. Active recruitment of new members has been largely from the professional meteorologist group as in 1954. During the year, thirtysix new members were elected, of which 30 were Associate members. At the year's end, two applications for Fellowship had been approved by Council but processing had not been completed.

2.1. There were five resignations during the year, all Associates.

2.2. Four transfers were arranged, including two from U.K. to Canada and two from Associate to Fellow.

2.3. Suspensions arising from non-payment of 1955 fees were unusually high. This resulted from the new date, June 30th, set at the last annual meeting, on which privileges of membership cease if annual subscriptions remain unpaid. In this regard it might be noted that according to By-Laws of the Parent Society it is the practice in U.K. to allow four months for payment of dues compared to six months now provided for Canadian Branch members. On July 1st, 1955, seventy-four members had not paid their 1955 fees and were therefore suspended. During the balance of the year payments of 1955 fees continued to be made and as of December 31st forty-four suspended members had been reinstated by the Executive. The earlier cut-off date for payment of fees has substantially assisted the Treasurer and Secretary in carrying out their duties and in preparation of year end reports for the Parent Society and the annual meeting. It is anticipated that the number of suspensions will be substantially decreased in forthcoming years as members become more accustomed to payment of fees in the early part of the year.

2.4. The Executive again processed only those applications for membership which were followed up or accompanied by full payment of fees so that no confusion has arisen during the year with regard to actual membership as compared to occasions in the past when applicants failed to follow up after submitting an application. 3. Changes of address continued to present a continuing problem with mail being returned from time to time due to use of an incorrect address. Members are urged to advise the Secretary of new addresses and help prevent lost and delayed deliveries. Some difficulty continued to be experienced with delivery of publications from the United Kingdom, leading to undesirable delays in redistribution to members of the Canadian Branch. Such difficulties seemed to be associated with the late summer season when holidays to some extent prevent normal supervision of shipments in the U.K. The usual excellent co-operation by Meteorological Headquarters staff and availability of its facilities provided a very real asset in getting the considerable work done associated with distribution of periodicals

5. During the year a new Centre was organized at Winnipeg. The enthusiasm of the members in that general area was ably directed by the Councillor-at-Large and others who co-operated to form an active local group. The Winnipeg Centre elected the following Executive.

The first meeting was addressed by the President of the Canadian Branch and typical of the interest at this Centre is the sixty mile drive by two members through a prairie storm, while another came by air when roads were impassable.

The Montreal Centre continued to hold well attended lecturediscussion meetings during the year and, with the active participation of University personnel, the activities of this Centre were broad in scope and well supported by local members. The Pre-Conference Symposium on Meteorology held October 14th proved to be a very successful introduction to this form of meeting. On the Executive of the Montreal Centre are:

6. The Toronto Centre again organized and sponsored a public lecture which took place in the theatre of the Royal Ontario Museum on the evening of November 24th. As last year, there was no charge and expenses which involved the rent of the hall only were met by local subscription from members, of the Foronto Centre. The turnout at this year's public lecture was not as large as in 1954 and careful consideration will no doubt be required when such a meeting is considered in 1956.

7. The Executive gave continuing attention to the development of a Canadian Branch publication, realizing that with the increasing number of Centres, the need for a publication to co-ordinate activities in Canada was increasing in proportion. The problem of cost continued to be a major obstacle, however it is hoped that definite action on this project can be taken in the not too distant future. It is hoped that the next Executive will give this project active consideration. Suggestions from the membership regarding title, content and format are invited. In the meantime it appears that the Canadian Branch publications could be advantageously expanded to include copy from Centres, letters, comment and other information of general interest to members at large.

9. Publications containing the text of addresses given at the regular Branch meetings in Toronto were distributed. The general question of distribution of texts of talks given to Centres of the Canadian Branch requires careful consideration in view of the Montreal and Winnipeg Centres now operating, and will require co-ordination by the next Executive, keeping in mind the possibility of developing a suitable type of Canadian Branch publication.

It has become increasingly evident that the program for the Toronto meetings could be better co-ordinated by an appointed Program Committee. The Executive therefore made such an appointment and it is recommended that the practic will be continued in future.

10. The President's Prize for 1.954 was announced at the Annual Meeting and awarded at the February meeting of the Toronto Centre. The prize - "Tropical Meteorology", by Richl was awarded to Mr. R.E. Munn for his paper entitled "A Graphical Method of Forecasting Ceiling and Visibility as Applied to Torbay, Nfld.". 11. The first Darton Prize was awarded to Dr. D.P. McIntyre and R. Lee for "Jet Streams in Middle and High Latitudes".

The second Darton Prize went to Dr. J.S. Marshall for his contribution to the paper "Turbulence in Clouds as a Factor in Precipitation", by J.S. Marshall and T.W.R. East (Quarterly Journal, R.M.S., January 1954).

The year 1955 has in many ways been quite a successful year 12. with definite progress made in redrafting the By-Laws, and the establishment of an additional Centre in Western Canada. No articles were, however, submitted for appraisal by the Referee Committee. This report would not be complete without drawing attention to the fine contribution by the Chairman of the Membership Committee whose keen personal interest resulted in a substantial number of new memberships in the Canadian Branch.

# ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BY-LAWS COMMITTEE Canadian Branch, Royal Meteorological Society - 1955

1. The By-laws Committee undertook a complete revision of the By-laws of the Canadian Branch. The proposed By-laws were submitted to the Executive Committee of the Canadian Branch on September 23, 1955. These proposed By-laws are based primarily on the Charter and By-laws of the Royal Meteorological Society (1953 Edition) using the By-laws of the Canadian Branch (1942) as a guide.

2. The By-laws Committee recommends that certain working agreements between the Branch and The Society be clearly set down on paper by the Executive Committee and be submitted to The Society for approval. A manual of such agreements if kept amended as new agreements are reached would maintain the continuity of relations with The Society and provide ready guidance to new members of the Executive Committee. This Committee further recommends that a similar manual be maintained for working agreements between The Branch and the various Local Centers as they are organized.

## REPORT OF THE MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE - 1955

1. The activities of the Membership Committee were directed along similar lines to those in past years in so far as the recruiting campaign was concerned. Letters appointing local membership chairmen were sent to all forecast offices. The local chairman was urged to approach each non RMS member in order to acquaint them with the advantages of society membership. In this respect it was suggested that a strong society could do much to advance the meteorological profession and meteorology generally.

2. The response to these letters was very good in most cases, in a few cases it was not so good, especially in those offices where a large block of non RMS members existed. A letter campaign seems to be the only practical method of making contact with the majority of meteorologists, however at every opportunity the membership chairman contacted prospective members personally in order to acquaint them with the activities of the Society.

3. The formation of a local branch of the RMS in the Winnipeg District stimulated enthusiasm in the Society in that area. Membershipwise it had an immediate effect. After contacting several people in professional and non-professional fields outside of meteorology we felt that active local branch programs would do a great deal toward interesting these "outsiders" in our activities.

4. Our membership list shows that during the year 45 new members were enrolled in the RMS, Canadian Branch. Another list which shows RMS members in good standing as of 1 Oct 55, indicates a drop of 65 members when compared to the 9 Nov 54 list. It is hoped that a large part of this group have now paid up their fees and are once more in good standing. However, the fact cannot be ignored that many members are lost every year. In an effort to hold the interest of all members at a higher level we think that a newsy publication concerning the Canadian Branch would do much to make the organization more interesting, particularly to members who seldom have the opportunity to attend meetings. 5. As the work of the Membership Committee cannot help but increase in future years, we recommend that the next chairman of this committee appoint two deputy chairmen, one to look after Meteorologist recruiting and the other to look after Meteorological Officer recruiting. The chairman of the committee could coordinate the work of the deputies with the secretary and he could spend his own spare time in a concentrated effort to recruit members from outside the profession.

6. I have considered it a privilege to have been chairman of the RMS Canadian Branch Membership Committee for the year 1955 and I would like to express my thanks to the executive and the members at large for their valuable assistance.

#### REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT'S PRIZE COMMITTEE

1. The President's Prize Committee, convened for the purpose of selecting the winnter of the President's Prize for 1955, and recommending the winners of the Darton Prizes for 1955, consisted of the following Members:

> R.C. Graham - Chairman F.W. Benum Dr. W.L. Godson T.J.G. Henry

2. The President's Prize is awarded to the author of the best paper presented to the Royal Meteorological Society, Canadian Branch. This year the Committee interpreted this to mean any paper accepted for publication by the Branch, or accepted for publication in a recognized publication; and which had been presented before a general meeting of the Branch or one of its Centres, or had been passed by the Referee Committee of the Branch.

3. The Committee unanimously agreed to recommend that the <u>President's Prize</u> be awarded to Messrs. B.W. Boyille, W.S. Creswick and J.J. <u>Gillis for their paper entitled</u> "A Frontal Jet Stream Cross Section", published in "Tellus" for August 1955 and presented before the Montreal Centre.

4. The Darton Prizes are awarded annually in respect of the most meritorious papers by a Canadian member, published during the year in the Society's publications. It was unanimously agreed to recommend the following awards - the first Darton Prize to Mr. Roy Lee, for his paper "Synoptic Evidence for a Direct Circulation about a Jet Stream" that appeared as a shorter contribution in the Quarterly Journal of the Royal Meteorological Society for July 1955; and the second Darton Prize to Messra. Anderson, Boville and McClellan, for their paper "An Operational Frontal Contour Analysis Model" that was published in the Quarterly Journal for October 1955.
