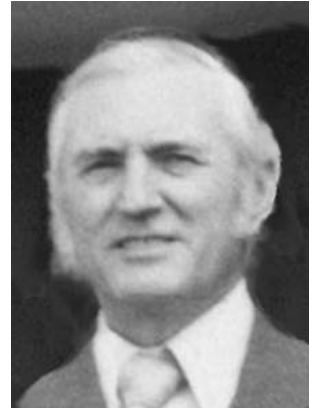


Donald Patrick McIntyre (1916-1992) was the son of the Rev Edward A. and Clara McIntyre, both of whom served as editors of the *Canadian Churchman*. His interest in meteorology was expressed when graduating from Ridley College; University of Toronto in 1938 with a scholarship in mathematics. He became a founding member of the Canadian Branch of the Royal Meteorological Society.



During the Second World War, which interrupted his studies, he served as Officer-in-Charge of the weather office in Prince George, BC. In 1949 he received a Ph.D. from the University of Chicago for a dissertation *On the Barocline Structures of the Westerlies*.

Returning to the Meteorological Service he became head of Research and Training, then Director-General of Research and was a member of the Canadian delegation at the 1972 Stockholm United Nations Conference on the Human Environment.

During his terms as president of the Canadian Branch of the RMS (1953-55) he gave two addresses, *Meteorological Research and Education in Canada*, and *Meteorology - 2000 A.D.*

After retirement, he was a consultant and helped develop the CMOS consultant accreditation program. Donald P. McIntyre died in North York on 15 October 1992.
